CORONA AGREEMENTS

- If your child has a cold, cough or fever, keep your child at home.
Your child can go back to school if he / she is free of complaints for 2 days or has a negative test.
- If there is an infection in the group, the whole group must stay at home for 5 days.
- The children can go back to school after 5 days if they are free of complaints, they can go to school earlier if they can hand over a negative test.
- Do you, as a parent or other family member over the age of 12, have corona-related complaints? Keep your child at home until you are free of complaints for 2 days or can hand over a negative test.
- Students that have to stay at home due to corona, get online education.
- Corona positive within the family? Your child has to stay home, follow the GGD guidelines.

ALL-IN-1 TRAFFIC AND TRANSPORT WEEK 1 AND 2

Week 1: on the road; from way back to now

Hunters traveled on foot long ago. A messenger ran with a message.

You could drive faster with pack animals. Pack animals also carried a lot of (heavy) items.

Horses, donkeys, cattle, camels and elephants are pack animals.

After this came the carts and wagons on wheels. Then came the stagecoach.

The first steam train in the Netherlands ran in 1839.

The bicycle and petrol engine were invented around 1880.

After that, cars, motorcycles, buses and trucks were built.

The roads used to be made of sand and clay. Then there was more traffic and roads were built with pavers. Now roads are made of concrete and asphalt.

BC only: First, people sailed with rafts and hollowed-out tree trunks.

Later on came large sailing boats and then steam ships.

After this came ships that run on diesel oil.

Only C: First there was the hot air balloon to fly with. In 1903 it stayed for the first time a plane briefly in the air. There were always better, bigger and faster aircraft, such as jet aircraft. Rocket engines also allowed humans to travel through space.

Week 2: Traffic on the road

There are different types of roads. Highways are built on behalf of the government.

Highways can be recognized by the letter A in the road number, such as the A7.

Many highways also have an E number. Then such a road is an important European connecting road.

The province takes care of the provincial roads. The letter N stands in front of the road number, such as N337

Municipalities are also building roads through cities and towns. These municipal roads maintain the municipality. Signposts show you the way.

BC only: Or you use a navigation system.

Roads are made of clinkers, concrete, sand or smooth asphalt.

Water remains on smooth asphalt.

You can skid, the rainwater splashes and you have poor visibility.

There are many holes in zoab, so that the water immediately sinks.



WEEK OF TRAFFIC

Traffic Week is an activity week intended to make children, parents and schools extra traffic aware and to give traffic education a positive boost. Moving independently and safely through traffic is a skill that every child must master, especially in a city like Amsterdam. This week, children and parents are reminded that traffic is fun, but also of vital importance.

The following classes are taught at our school:

VR Lesson

Experience the Amsterdam Traffic in Virtual Reality! Students from groups 6 to 8 learn how to deal with different traffic situations with a special app and VR glasses.

Traffic quiz

Who knows the traffic rules best? During a quiz, students compete in class to win a prize. The questions must be answered by True (left) or False (right). Students answer the questions in groups. The questions are discussed in class so that the students understand which traffic rule is in force.
